
For our families, teachers, friends, catechists, priests and all those who support young people. Thank you for all that they do for us. Allow us to work together to make a better world for all.

A FEW YOUTH GROUP GAMES...

Silent counting

Good team game


The group has to count a certain number set by the catechists or leaders and the young people sit in a circle in silence, they each shout out a number in sequence, the aim is to take it in turns but they can't go round the circle. This takes great skill from the group and concentration; they keep trying until they reach the set number given to

One tale and two truths

This game is simply getting to know one another, so the young people make up two true facts about themselves and one lie, they then tell the group the three facts about them and the group has to guess which one is the tale.

Jockey up Jockey down

- 1. Tell the group to get into pairs,
- 2. Get them to designate one person from their pair to be the "jockey" and one person to be the "horse".
- 3. The horse need to stand in a small circle in the middle, facing the back of the person in front of them. (ie. when they walk forward they should be travelling around the circle, following the person in front of them).
 - 4. The jockeys need to do the same thing except in a large circle around the horses



- galloping around their circle). Then the leader says "Jockeys go!" and the jockeys will run around their circle. 6. When the leader yells "Jockeys up!" the
- jockeys must all find their partners and place their hands on the horse's shoulders. The slowest pair are out
- 7. To add some more interest, you can make the players change direction.



Mix & Meet

Good for discussion and getting to know each other Get each person to grab some M&M's. Tell them not to eat them.

Assign a different meaning to each colour:

Blue = family Green = school Yellow = friends Red = hobbies Brown = music/movies

However many M&Ms they have in their hands, that is how many facts they have to tell. For example, if they have three blue, they would have to say three facts about their family.

Youth Group Session Acts of Mercy

Youth Group Session based on the Gospel used for the Feast of Christ the Universal King, on National Youth Sunday 2017. We recommend that before the session you read the Gospel of the Day and encourage some discussion beforehand.

ACTIVITY

Have the images printed out and spread out for young people to explore. DO NOT INCLUDE THE TITLE OF THE IMAGE.

Set the scene with some reflective meditative music. Ask the young people to slowly move to each image and reflect on what each picture might represent. How does it make them feel? After a good amount of time ask the young people to choose one of these images below. In pairs ask them to talk about why they chose that image, what was it that drew you to the picture.

Shelter the homeless



Feed the hungry



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Bury the dead

ACTIVITY

Match the corporal act of mercy to the pictures.

Have a list of the corporal acts of mercy printed out. Ask young people to select which image it represents.

WHAT'S NEXT

Discussion time

In small groups explore what practical things they can do to engage with the Acts of Mercy. For example, charity fundraising, Youth SVP, CAFOD, Aid to the Church in Need.

Leave time for feedback.

PRAYER
